D-Day.

Three years ago I signed up to be a Paratrooper. I thought it would be a good way to see the world, but also, to get one back on Hitler. Boy was I wrong. I hadn't been on a mission yet but my Battalion had suffered heavy losses. It was a daylight mission and they were sitting ducks.

I was woken up by our second Lieutenant Ratama yelling at us to "get our lazy bums out of bed, get dressed and stand to attention outside our Barracks." Once we were ready 2nd lieutenant Ratama gave us our briefing. It was a night raid, and we were to attack a village in Normandy called Vierville-sur-mer. A Nazi stronghold. We were also going to be backed up by troops coming in from the sea and spitfires with us the whole way. It was said that there was a French resistance group in the area lead by Captain Zarn Beaver.

The roar of the army trucks was the only thing keeping us awake on the boring drive to the airfield where 15 big planes awaited our arrival. The only things we saw was craters and burned out houses where bombs had landed.

When we got to the airfield we got out of the trucks and had a stretch. I looked around and saw engineers running around the planes like bees around a beehive. Lieutenant Ratama ordered us to grab some weapons. I got a M3A1 submachine gun, 4 F1 grenades and a hunting knife. Then we grabbed our backpacks and put rations and extra ammo. Then we got handed our parachutes.

The hum of the planes loud in my ears. I was freezing even though I'm wearing lots of warm clothes. I was cold because we are flying at a high altitude. We were flying in a triangular formation with the other 14 planes. At the moment we are flying over the English Channel just about to enter France. "10 minutes to drops." lieutenant Ratama yelled. "Hook onto the line and check the pack of the man in front of you. Lets go. 5 minutes to drop."

My nerves are building. Flak is racing towards our plane. One of our spitfires gets hit and disintegrated in mid air. BANG, flak rips up our tail. "Jump, Jump. Go go go go." We didn't need to be told twice, our line started forward. Suddenly, it is my turn to jump. I am silently scared but I know I have to jump. Then I find the courage and jump. BOOM! I jump just as the plane blows up. The only casualties are lieutenant Ratama and the pilots.

I land safely but am alone in a hollow. Suddenly, gunfire leaps into action on the other side of the hollow. I creep up the embankment and see five figures locked in a fire fight. It is dark but I can still make out 3 Nazis and 2 of my own men. I take aim at the nearest Nazi to me and "BANG, BANG, BANG, BANG, BANG, BANG, BANG, BANG, BANG," It feels like the gun was kicking me in the shoulder. All three of the Nazis drop. I drop my mag and replace it with a new one. Then I shout "Cheerhoo, that will teach you ya Nazi scum." Then, I run down to my mates and start advancing toward the village.

At the village a massive firefight has began I join in straight away. A man beside me gets shot in the head. Suddenly, the Nazis start getting shot from behind. It doesn't take me long to figure out that it's the French Resistance group. The Nazis are getting advanced on fast from both sides. After about 1 hour the Nazis were either dead or a P.O.W. I had been shot in the leg.

Medical teams race around the wounded. I got loaded onto a truck and taken to the medical ship. The doctor there told me I would have to spend about 4 weeks in the hospital before I would be able to return to the front line. I am relieved but also excited.



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Policies Under Review.

Improving Educational Outcomes for Māori Students

Our <u>charter</u> includes aims that reflect the unique position of Māori culture in New Zealand society. These aims promote the value of te reo (Māori language) and tikanga Māori (Māori culture).

Also see Recognition of Cultural Diversity.

The board and staff consult with the Māori community when developing plans and targets for improving the progress and achievement of Māori students (NAG 1).

These aims are in accordance with the principles of the <u>Treaty of Waitangi</u> and are legal requirements in relation to Māori under the Education Act, 1989.

Tinui School regularly monitors and reports on Māori student achievement. To ensure success for Māori students, Tinui School:

- uses the Ministry of Education's 5-year plan, <u>Ka Hikitia Accelerating Success: The Māori Education Strategy 2013-2017</u>, in our thinking, planning, and action for Māori learners
- tracks the achievement of all Māori students using our student management system (SMS)
- identifies any areas where a Māori student's educational achievement is not in line with their peers
- ensures that support programmes for Māori students are provided, if necessary
- supports staff in implementing effective practices that promote success for Māori students
- evaluates the impact of these programmes and practices and uses this information in our self-review
- reports regularly on the progress of Māori students to parents, the board, and the Ministry of Education.
